

AN OPEN LETTER TO OUR BISHOPS AND DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

Dear Bishops and District Superintendents,

You are talented, intelligent and faithful people with leadership abilities, or you wouldn't have been elected and appointed to serve as you are. You put a lot of time

and effort into what you do. You are loved and respected by us, the clergy and laity of your conferences and districts. I write to you asking your forgiveness on behalf of the churches who call you Bishop or District Superintendent. Forgive us for misusing you.

At a time when we need preachers, teachers, prophets, and evangelists, we are using you to collect reports and be at committee meetings. At a time when we community organizers, church need planters, pastoral models, and innovators, we are using you to make budgets and do perfunctory duties. And because we misuse you, we don't see you as we should. You come to our churches and preach good sermons and sometimes speak prophetic words, but we don't see you as preachers or prophets. We see you as Bishops and District Superintendents making your rounds. We don't see you as fellow workers

in the fields, but as hierarchy from headquarters. We don't see you standing with us, but standing before us. We don't see you as a part of our ministry, but apart from our ministry.

Methodist bishops and superintendents were put in leadership roles to serve the churches. Over time this arrangement has flip-flopped to where churches serve the hierarchy. How we arrived to where we are, I'm not completely sure. I do know that we have lost sight of what our founders and frontier preachers intended. A basic principle of the Protestant Reformation was "the church reformed, but always being reformed."

One of the key points of a modern reformation for United Methodism would be changing the roles of our bishops and district superintendents. What we need today, more than ever, are servant leaders. Servant leaders don't lead from high offices, but by walking the talk with people on the road, hunkering down with them in the trenches, and doing the hard work of being the Church.

I'm not saying we need to change your titles or go to a congregational system. I am saying we should be using your talents in more productive and engaging ways. I am bringing to your attention a cry that is out there in your Conferences and Districts. It's a cry for servant leaders who can be:

talked with unofficially,
dreamed with daringly,
decisive with openness,
tough with kindness,
encouraging with hopefulness,
supportive with compassion.

We, clergy and laity, want so much to feel close to you. The more you live out humble and authentic servant leadership, the more we will walk by your side.

We have had several letters, emails and phone calls this summer from people new to Kimball's ministry. They want to know more about this servant evangelist in the United Methodist Church. Although many of you have traveled the roads with us through the years, we thought it might be good to refresh his journey over the past 36 years with our new readers.

In the late 70's when televangelists were blasting the television with mixed messages so foreign to Kimball's roots in the United Methodist Church, he began to question, "Where are the evangelists who speak for God with a prophetic vision and call? He prayed, he talked with his bishop and district superintendent, his mentors from seminary, his colleagues and his family. Everyone agreed our theology needed to have more of a presence in the media world but there was no appointment for evangelism in our conference...no salary, no parsonage, no pension. But that still small voice, the one he had heard and answered to the ministry, was calling him again... "Use what you have learned as a pastor and speak for me as a different kind of a messenger, a servant evangelist in the prophetic spirit." Humbly, he said, "Lord, I know I am not the best preacher in the Conference, but I will give you my all. Walk with me ~ Use me."

Thirty six years ago he had no idea how to begin. He only knew that he was not alone and that there was a need for evangelism with integrity in our world. There were no road maps for him but there were directions: be faithful, be authentic, be prophetic, be challenging, be creative, be resourceful, be hopeful, be diligent, be humble, be bold, be daring, be compassionate, be patient, be loving.

Having witnessed his commitment and challenging call to servant evangelism, we are blessed to be a part of his ministry. In the agape spirit Kimball and Pam live, we thank you for the many ways you, too, walk and talk with them. You are God's still small voice giving them the encouragement and hope that they are being faithful to that decision made long ago.
